### Tested by pain and sickness

The resurrection of Jesus is a unique event in the history of humanity. Jesus is the only one who has been raised from the dead, without dying again. His resurrection is a source of hope for us as well: 'For this very reason, Christ died and returned to life so that he might be the Lord of both the dead and the living' (Rom. 14:9). The resurrection of Jesus allows us to understand, to believe and to hope that, beyond our death, another life is waiting for us. By his resurrection, Christ accomplishes and brings to perfection the mystery of the incarnation: 'God became man so that

man might become God' (St. Athanasius). The risen Jesus brings the power of his resurrection into our little deaths, into our failures and into our sufferings. Let us not allow hope to die in us, even at the heart of our most terrible sufferings, for hope does not deceive (Rom. 5:5).

During this month we shall pray that this hope may fill the hearts of those who suffer. For the heart is the place where everything that the human person experiences in body and soul comes together. Affective, moral, psychological and physical sufferings all have effects on the heart. It is the same with joys; they also spring up in the heart. Jesus' desire is that our hearts should cease to be troubled (Jn. 14:1). Rooted in the heart of Jesus, our hearts can be filled with peace, despite the sufferings that we experience (Jn. 14:27; Mt. 11:28).

Who indeed, in our world, is not tested by sorrow or sickness? I have come to understand that there are more sufferings than we imagine. Even people who are apparently well have so many inward sufferings, especially in their hearts. All the same, I also think that there are some who suffer more than others. I myself have so many things that could make me suffer, but I relativize them when I realize that there are people who suffer more than I do. For example the youth, 15 years old, whose family did not have enough money to pay for his treatment, and who died before my very eyes; or the man whom I saw getting on the bus, carrying an oxygen cylinder so that he could breathe, and whose life depends on it; or, again, the prisoners who only have one miserable meal a day, and whose trial is forgotten or neglected because they have no one to plead their cause. Or the mother of a family who spends sleepless nights, asking herself what her children will eat tomorrow... or quite simply this young girl desperately waiting for a husband who never comes...

Sufferings like these affect the whole being, and show through on the face. But I know that, even if they are forgotten by society, the risen Jesus does not forget all these people. With you, during this month, I pray that he may visit in a special way all those who are afflicted by so many sufferings, and, especially, that he may heal their hearts. (Fr. Rigobert Kyungu SJ)
